

Highlights: Ohio State Blasts Nebraska In Lincoln

Despite the hype and excitement, and even the presence of ESPN's College Gameday, Ohio State's Saturday night matchup with Nebraska was, as some expected, never close. The Buckeyes rolled early, and kept it going all night long on the way to a statement win over the Cornhuskers, 48-7. Ohio State couldn't have started any better than it did, with a Jeff Okudah interception just a few plays into the game, and Justin Fields touchdown run on the drive immediately after the pick.

The Buckeye defense had no plans to slow down, either. The next drive saw Baron Browning sack Adrian Martinez to force a fourth down.

The Buckeyes capped the first half with yet another touchdown, this time to Austin Mack in the back corner of the end zone, to take a 38-0 lead into the locker room.
